

PROCESS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF POLICE & PUBLIC SAFETY PSYCHOLOGY POSTDOCTORAL RESIDENCY COMPETENCIES

The residency competencies for Police & Public Safety Psychology (PPSP) were derived from the published education and training guidelines developed by the PPSP specialty council (Council of Organizations in Police Psychology [COPP]) and the domain-specific “behavioral anchors” contained in the examination manual published by the American Board of Police & Public Safety Psychology (ABPPSP; 11/5/2016, accessible at <https://abpp.org/files/page-specific/3606%20Police%20&%20Public%20Safety/ABPPSP%20Examination%20Manual.pdf>). Although the leadership for the development of the guidelines and residency competencies originated with COPP, approximately 40 police and public safety psychology specialists, representing the five national PPSP organizations (ABPPSP; American Academy of Police & Public Safety Psychology; American Psychological Association, Division 18, Police & Public Safety Section; International Association of Chiefs of Police, Police Psychological Services Section; Society for Police and Criminal Psychology), contributed to them.
